Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

It is the intent of our school to dispel the gap between disadvantaged pupils and their non-disadvantaged peers. The Pupil Premium is additional funding which is allocated to schools based on the number of pupils who have been eligible for free school meals (FSM) at any point over the last six years. The Pupil Premium is aimed at addressing the current underlying inequalities which exist between children from disadvantaged backgrounds and their more affluent peers. The Pupil Premium also provides funding for children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months and the children of service personnel. The number of pupils entitled to Free School Meals (FSM) is below the national average n/a 27% school = 14%. The number of disadvantaged pupils with SEN support is 15%. Pupils with an EHCP is 11%.

Overcoming barriers to learning is at the heart of our Pupil Premium Grant use. We understand that needs and costs will differ depending on the barriers to learning being addressed. We identify the barrier to be addressed and the interventions required, whether in small groups, large groups, the whole school or as individuals, and allocate a budget accordingly.

Our priorities are as follows:

- Ensuring all students receive good quality first teaching each lesson
- Closing the attainment gap between disadvantaged pupils and their peers
- Providing targeted academic support for students who are not making the expected progress.
- Addressing non-academic barriers to attainment such as attendance, behaviour, well being and cultural capital.
- Ensuring that the Pupil Premium Grant reaches the pupils who need it most.



Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	Internal and external (where available) assessments indicate that writing attainment among disadvantaged pupils is below (21%) that of non-disadvantaged pupils.
	There are no disadvantaged pupils at GDS in writing.
2	Internal and external (where available) assessments indicate that Maths among disadvantaged pupils (22%) is below that of non-disadvantaged pupils.
3	Assessments, observations, and discussions with pupils indicate under- developed oral language skills and vocabulary gaps among many disad- vantaged pupils. These are evident from Reception through to KS2 and in general, are more prevalent among our disadvantaged pupils than their peers.
4	15% of disadvantaged children are also identified as having a special educational need. 11% (x3 pupil) have an EHCP.
5	Our assessments and observations indicate that the education and wellbeing of many of our disadvantaged pupils have been impacted by partial school closures to a greater extent than for other pupils. These findings are supported by national studies.
	This has resulted in significant knowledge gaps leading to pupils falling further behind age-related expectations, especially in writing.
6	Our attendance data over the last year, indicates that attendance among some disadvantaged pupils is lower than 90%.
	Persistent absence (below 90% attendance) of Pupil premium is 21.7% (17.7% national)
	Our assessments and observations indicate that absenteeism is negatively impacting disadvantaged pupils' progress.
