Communication	A communication policy was ratified by governors and distributed to all parents and staff last academic year. This outlines how school will communicate with you, and how you should communicate with school, depending on your issue.	Communication policy will be redistributed to all, including teaching staff and timescales will be adhered to. Class newsletters to be consistent across all classes.
	There were comments saying that the school sends too many or not enough texts/ e-mail communication to parents. Teachers2parents remains our favoured method of communication with parents due to its speed and efficiency.	Teachers to welcome children at door each morning and take any quick messages from parents to improve communication. School Spider App will be kept up to date with events and news.
	The school aims to give parents as much notice as possible for dates and these will often appear on the Diary date section of the Newsletter. Nutrition and health.	School promotes healthy eating through various different ways such as in our science curriculum and personal, social, health curriculum.	A letter has been sent stating that we will not allow any sugary treats to be sent into school for birthdays.



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	Cheshire East catering provides healthy, balanced meals. Children are told the options on our dinner menu each morning. Options include 2 hot options (1 vegetarian) and a sub bar option which offers a range of fillings and a range of breads. Our salad bar has made a reappearance (it was taken away due to covid restrictions) We encourage children to try different foods and explore a range of hot and cold food.	Children are encouraged to bring healthy snacks to school. Parents informed not to send an afternoon snack. Fruit will be provided. Discussion with school council around promoting healthy eating in school.
More sports and after school clubs.	Our class teachers currently lead 1 after school club per year and these range from art clubs to magazine clubs, choir to science clubs, drama club, storytelling club and many more that will be offered throughout the year at different points. Sports coaching group provide range of sporting clubs which change half termly such as cricket, dodgeball, gymnastics, dance.	Pupil voice to be carried out to ask the children what clubs they would like to see in school. School will complete an audit of after school provision.
Male teachers	School will always employ the teacher whom we feel is best suited to the role after the rigorous interview process, regardless of gender.	
Parents evening	We have had a lot of mixed messages with regards parents evening. A lot of parents have stated how they prefer the video calls compared to the face to face sessions due to the flexibility of these. Parents who usually are unable to attend parents meetings can now do so. Similarly, we have had numerous parents state that they would prefer to return to face to face meetings.	In order to try to cater for all preferences, this year, we will use a hybrid approach to parents evening over 2 evenings. One evening will be used for video calls for those parents who value the flexibility of a video call. One evening will be face to face meetings in your child's classroom. School will communicate dates for parents evening and set up a booking system well in advance.
Homework	Again, we had very mixed views regarding homework. Some parents believed that there is too much homework whilst others believed it is not enough. Some thought that it is too hard and some too easy.	All classes to use a Learning Logs book for homework across all classes. KS1: Reading encouraged daily Spellings sent home weekly (learning log)



	Staff have met to discuss homework and how this will be set this year; how we can make it interesting, relevant yet consistent across the school.	One activity set on Mathshed per week. This will link to work in class that week. KS2: Spelling sent home weekly (learning log) One activity set on Mathshed per week. This will link to work in class One activity set - could be from any other subject. e.g piece of RE work, reading comprehension, History research. (learning log)
More school trips	Due to increase in petrol costs, cost of coaches have more than doubled in the last 6 months. School staff are very conscious of asking for payment for trips, particularly considering cost of living crises at the moment, along with covid and furlough in previous years. Staff have now met and discussed how we can provide trips, visits and visitors for little or no cost.	Each class to go on 1 main trip per year. Class teachers have mapped out which trips and visitors will take place each term that compliments the learning that term. This will be communicated via class newsletter and e-mail.
SEND provision	A new SENCO is in role this year. Support staff are used across the school to support various children in various aspects of the curriculum. Class teachers and leaders ensure quality first teaching is in place that caters for all needs and abilities. Support plans are reviewed termly.	School will complete an audit of our provision for children on SEND register. We will purchase a range of new and up to date interventions. Use of hub as a break out space/ intervention space. We will Increase our pupil staff and parent voice activities. School to look into offering some parent training around different aspects of Special Educational Needs. School to look into how we can improve the children's awareness of Special Educational Needs.
Parking	Due to staff commitments in school it is impossible for a member of staff to monitor the parking in the afternoon. Mr Jones monitors the parking in the morning.	Cones and signs have been purchased to act as a barrier to stop parents from parking in the yellow boxes.



		PCSO have been contacted and will make more regular visits to the school. Consistent reminders sent to all parents/ carers regarding parking considerately to keep our children safe.
Sports competitions.	Due to covid and staffing issues, sporting competitions have been less frequent these past 2 years. We will make a considered effort to attend more inter-school competitions this current year.	Mrs Quinn is to plan the competitions for the rest of the term and communicate these with children, teachers and parents.
My Child's Progress and what my child is learning	Parent consultations held in the Autumn and Spring terms provide a starting point for discussion about how your child is progressing academically as well as their friendships and wider interests. They do also provide next steps for learning. However, we also operate an open door policy so that should you feel you would like further clarification on how to help your child at home and their next steps, please do contact your child's class teacher. The school website contains information regarding the National Curriculum, as well as curriculum overviews for each year group and end of year expectations. Bullying	We have a very rigorous anti-bullying policy which is available on request. The school has very few bullying incidents. Quite often it is friendship issues that can be resolved using restorative practice approaches by staff.
